

# Union schedules Mitchell concert

The University Union has planned a full calendar for winter quarter, highlighted by the Joni Mitchell concert scheduled for Feb. 3.

Mitchell's will be the only concert for which students will have to pay admission, according to Union Cultural Committee Chairman Tom Katzenmeyer.

Films such as *Lezzy*, *The Godfather*, *McCabe & Mrs. Miller*, *Monty Python and the Holy Grail*, *Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf* and *Fritz the Cat* will be shown at SPJ.

There will be three art exhibits in the Memorial art gallery. Currently on exhibit are 19th Century American quilts from the collection of Elizabeth Itadisill.

"Drinking Vessels," a collection of pottery made by Happy Valley Pottery, an artist colony outside of Watkinsville, will be displayed Jan. 27-Feb. 10.

Carol Goldin-Miller, a print-maker at Agnes Scott College, will exhibit some of her work in the gallery Feb. 24-March 12.

**CULTURE IS HIGHLIGHTED** in two main productions sponsored by the Union. The fourth annual opera-dinner will take place Jan. 30-31. "Pirates of Penzance," produced by assistant professor Dr. Joe Amaya, features University students largely from the opera workshop course.

Tickets are \$4 for students, \$2 for meal plan participants, and \$5 general admission. Snelling Hall will cater the dinner.

"The Gate of Justice," a major choral

piece written by and featuring Dave Brubeck, will be performed March 7-8 in the Fine Arts auditorium.

Sponsored jointly by the music department and the Union, this concert utilizes the University Oratorio Chorus, the wind ensemble and the percussion ensemble.

Mark Lane will lecture on the JFK assassination Feb. 14 in Memorial ballroom.

A national theatre touring company will present "The World of Carl Sandburg" Jan. 15, and "Synthesia," a multi-media concert, will perform in the ballroom Feb. 4.

**MANY CONCERTS** are planned for this quarter, though Union Entertainment Coordinator Jeff Rowe said there would be more if the committee had a location to use.

Glenn Phillips will play tonight in the ballroom at 8 p.m. Formerly with the Hampton Grease Band, Phillips plays progressive jazz.

Thursday night offers two concerts for students: Mack McCray, renowned pianist, plays in the chapel at 8 p.m., and Darryl Rhoades & the Ha-Ha-Vishnu Orchestra will give two shows in the ballroom, at 8 and 10 p.m.

Entertainers ranging from comedian Tom Parks to guitarist and lutist William Mathews to the black soul group Mother's Finest will also be brought to campus by the Union, with free student admission.

Rowe added the Union is looking into bringing concerts to clubs off-campus, where students would be able to enjoy a group in a night club atmosphere at no charge.
